

UKOSS is five years old!

Thank you to all who have contributed to the studies completed over the last five years. Thanks to your tremendous efforts, UKOSS studies have:

- Demonstrated a significant reduction in the incidence of eclampsia in the UK
- Established the role of thromboprophylaxis guidelines in the prevention of antenatal pulmonary embolism
- Confirmed the association of caesarean section delivery with peripartum hysterectomy
- Investigated the second line management of severe haemorrhage
- Reported adverse outcomes of pregnancy in women with extreme obesity
- Rapidly surveyed H1N1v infection ("swine flu") in pregnancy

Our particular thanks to those of you who have collaborated with the H1N1v influenza study. To date 352 cases have been reported with 65% of data collection forms returned. The graph to the right illustrates the notification dates of confirmed cases, showing the decrease in case reports as the epidemic has declined. Note that data collection for the swine flu study will cease on 31 January 2010; do not report any women admitted to hospital after this date.

New Studies

Myeloproliferative disorders

Data collection for this study starts on 1st January, with the condition listed for the first time on the next blue card. Folder documentation is enclosed with this newsletter.

Key points

- Historical literature suggests myeloproliferative disorders are associated with increased maternal and fetal morbidity and mortality.
- There have been no prospective national studies to estimate the incidence or outcomes of myeloproliferative disorders, persistent thrombocytosis or erythrocytosis in pregnancy.
- This study of myeloproliferative disorders, persistent thrombocytosis or erythrocytosis in pregnancy will investigate the incidence, management and outcomes for mother and infant.

Case definition

All pregnant women in the UK identified as having:

- EITHER a myeloproliferative disorder (essential thrombocythaemia, polycythaemia vera, myelofibrosis), diagnosed by a consultant haematologist according to WHO guidelines
- OR a thrombocytosis (platelet count persistently greater than 600 x109/l)
- OR an erythrocytosis (haemoglobin persistently greater than 16.5g/dl).

Sickle cell disease in pregnancy

Key points

- Sickle cell disease is the most common genetic disease in the UK and is associated with significant mortality and morbidity during pregnancy
- There are no prospective national studies to estimate the incidence or outcomes of pregnancy in patients with sickle cell disease.
- This study will investigate the incidence, management and outcomes for mother and infant in pregnancies where the mother has sickle cell disease.

Surveillance Period

February 2010 - February 2011

Case definition

Any pregnant woman in the UK identified as having sickle cell disease using the following definition:

Sickle cell disease including

homozygous sickle cell disease and

compound heterozygous conditions of haemoglobin S with haemoglobin C, D, E, O-Arab or Beta thalassaemia.

Pregnancies in women with sickle cell trait are **excluded**.


